A Message From Fr. Joseph Illo

My name is Fr. Joseph Illo and I will become your pastor this August. I express my deep gratitude to Fr. Mazza for his fine work as your pastor, as well as to all of Star's pastors and priests over the years (and let us not forget our dear Fr. Meriwether).

I was born in the Bronx and baptized at Star of the Sea parish on City Island, New York. It's Star of the Sea for me from Coast to Coast. Our Lady, the Stella Maris, has shone her love upon me ever since my mother put a miraculous medal around my neck in 1968.

My brother and I moved to San Francisco in 1983, after I had graduated from Penn State (English literature) and he from high school. A small Catholic publishing house (now Ignatius Press) gave both of us jobs (I worked as copyeditor), and we lived on McAllister Street. Our parish was ... Star of the Sea, and Msgr. Cornelius J. Burns was our pastor. We used to hide behind the curtains when we saw him making his way up the street, because it was either to raise funds or to recruit volunteers. Now it's my turn!

In 1991 I was ordained for the Diocese of Stockton, and served in various parishes for 20 years, with a few years as diocesan vocations director. The last two years have been as chaplain at the very fine Thomas Aquinas College in southern California, and I am simply delighted to be coming back to Star of the Sea with old friend Fr. Patrick Driscoll.

We are coming to establish an Oratory of St. Philip Neri in the City, God willing. There are many kinds of "oratory," which simply means a "place of prayer." But the particular kind that St. Philip Neri established in 1575, at his parish in Rome, is a "clerical association of pontifical rite." Simply put, an Oratory is a community of priests and brothers held together by the mighty bond of fraternal charity. Most secular priests pray their breviaries and rosaries alone. Many eat alone and recreate alone. I've done this, more or less, over the last 23 years, but I've always desired greater priestly community—I think we all do. Now comes the opportunity to do parish work and live in community. Thirty years ago most secular priests lived with at least three or four other priests, prayed the breviary together, took meals together, and spent down time together. The Oratory simply tries to regain fraternal community in a time of priestly isolation.

The most famous Oratorian Father for English-speakers is Blessed John Henry Newman, who brought the Oratory to England in 1848. Today there are 85 Oratories with 500 Oratorians in 19 countries. With the help of God and his holy mother, we would establish the first congregation of Oratorian Fathers in the Archdiocese of San Francisco, although a valiant attempt was made by the redoubtable Fr. Frank Filice in the 1980s. We will try again, and I might say, in more favorable conditions. Perhaps the Oratory is more needed today as priests get more stretched and more isolated.

Will the presence of the Oratory change the parish? Certainly we will strive to live the charism of our Founder, St. Philip Neri. He dedicated himself to joyful preaching, constant availability for confessions, and dynamic evangelization, especially for young people. He was above all a father to his priests and his people, and we hope to be faithful to that charism. Wikipedia has a fairly good article on St. Philip and another on the Oratory. Fr. Driscoll and I, and the Oratorians who will join us, hope to bring St. Philip's joy, the joy of knowing Jesus, to those we serve. We will have more articles and information sessions on the Oratory after we arrive in August.
